

They were treated as the property of the owners, who could make them do any work they wanted.



Six hours saved every year are added to make one day. 24 hours over a span of four years. This surplus day is added to the month of February. Thus every fourth year, February has 29 days instead of 28 days. Such a year with 366 days is called a leap year.
